- HES at 50 initiatives:

- Transition Period with New Editorial Team:
 - Even before the start of the transition period, we already had one virtual meeting with the new team to talk about the journal (April 12 2024)
 - Transition period: July 2024-June 2025
 - During transition period all incoming editors (Catherine Herfeld, Erwin Dekker, Harro Maas, Alexandre Mendes Cunha and Christina Laskaridis) will become associate editors of JHET
 - We plan to have an online meeting soon after the HES meeting to explain the journal's platform to the incoming team
 - Afterwards, we'll be assigning manuscripts newly submitted to them so that they can hopefully have a full revision cycle during the transition period

General announcements

- JHET Early Career Scholar Prize:
 - Approved by the Executive Committee in June 2023 and to become a regular prize of HES as other honors, we had the first award this year
 - The editors formed a committee with 3 people from the editorial board, following the prize rules approved, with a term structure that will eventually mean that people stay for three years, rotating one person out every year: Manuela Mosca (chair; 1 year); Verena Halsmayer (2 years); Jeff Biddle (3 years).
 - Eligibility criteria: papers published in JHET by early career scholars (solo or co-authored with other ECS only) in the preceding 3 calendar years (for the 2024 prize, papers published in 2021-2023). ECS is a graduate student or someone who completed her MA or PhD within the previous 4 calendar years (2020-2023).
 - There were 4 eligible papers, and the committee selected the one by Soroush Marouzi, “Frank Plumpton Ramsey and the Politics of Motherhood” (44, 4, 2022).

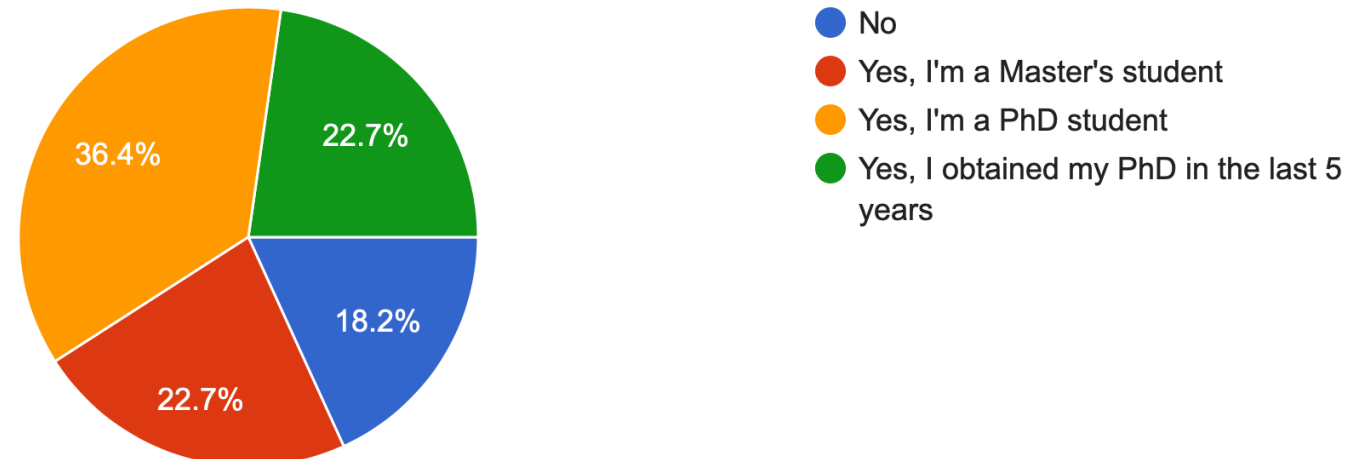
Which period best describes your main research interests in history of economic thought?

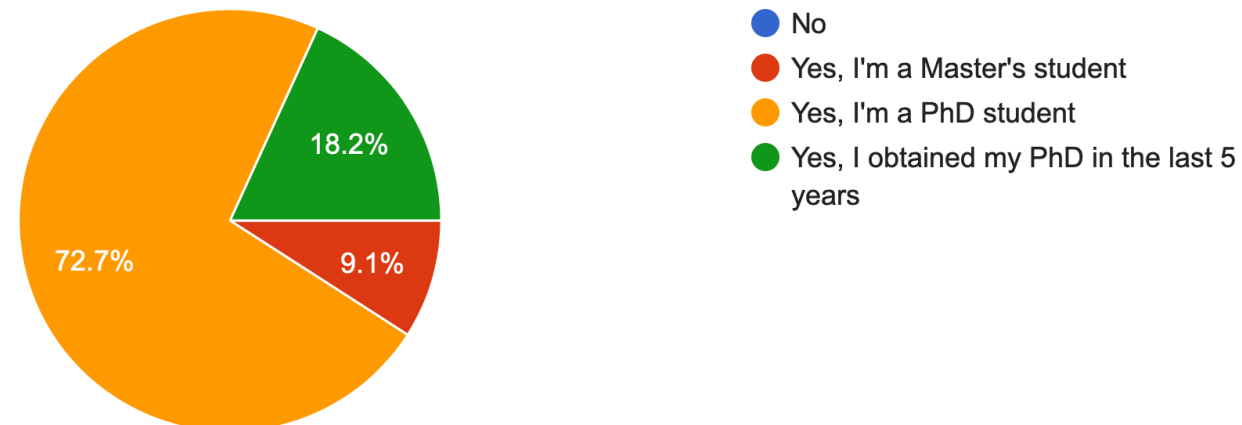
Which period best describes your main research interests in history of economic thought?

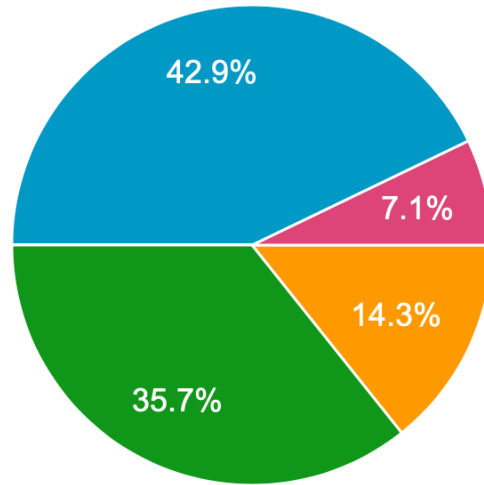

Which period best describes your main research interests in history of economic thought?

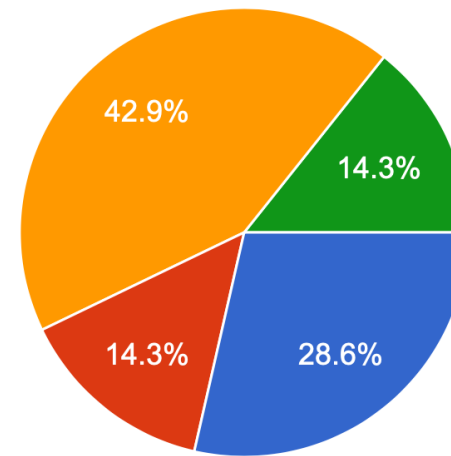
