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DISTINGUISHED FELLOW OF THE
HISTORY OF ECONOMICS SOCIETY

Dr. Marjorie Grice-Hutchinson was made a Distinguished Fellow of the History of Economics Society on June 12, 1994, at the twenty-first annual meeting at Babson College.

The Society recognizes Marjorie Grice-Hutchinson for her dedicated and persevering efforts toward a correct evaluation of the Salamanca School of "supply and demand" economists in the sixteenth century. In addition, she must be counted as one of a group of prominent scholars dedicated to reversing the negative and false image many scholars have of overall intellectual life south of the Pyrenees. In her writings, she has called attention to the diverse but always sparkling contributions of Arabic, Jewish and Christian writers, especially during the long period in which the rest of Europe sank into economic poverty and intellectual decline. The broad historical sweep of her research and her decades-long determination to "set the record straight" and give credit where credit is due are an inspiration to all intellectual historians.

Grice-Hutchinson's findings and interpretations can be found in the following books that she has written: *The School of Salamanca: Readings in Spanish Monetary Theory, 1544-1605*, Clarendon Press, Oxford, 1952; *Early Economic Thought in Spain 1177-1740*, Allen & Unwin, London, 1978; *Aproximación al pensamiento económico en Andalucía: de Séneca a finales del siglo XVII*, Editorial Librería Agora, Málaga, 1990; and *Economic Thought in*

Spain, Edward Elgar, Brookfield, Vermont, 1993.

Although Grice-Hutchinson served as a Spanish teacher in London during the 1940s and now holds an honorary position with the Department of Economics at the University of Málaga, most of her contributions were made without a full-time university appointment. Indeed, she kept up her research in several languages, including Latin, while tending to other matters and responsibilities associated with the farm in Spain that she owned and managed with her late husband, the Baron von Schlippenbach.

It is with profound appreciation for her contributions to the discipline and in anticipation of still more contributions in the years ahead that the Executive Committee unanimously agreed to confer on Marjorie Grice-Hutchinson the honor of Distinguished Fellow of the History of Economics Society.
